

Lunatic Van Beethoven

Dr. Keir Co.—PTE Mainstage

Was Beethoven a lunatic, a genius, or both? That is the question that Keir Cutler poses in this play. Is genius not one step removed from insanity?

Cutler appears as a “born again in the 21st century” Beethoven who attempts to dispel the myths around the “real” Beethoven.

Cutler shows what it’s like to be a child prodigy (Beethoven), forced by his father to play the piano as a young boy, and compete with the other prodigy of his time, Mozart.

Even more poignant was the actor’s portrayal of Beethoven’s illnesses, especially going deaf—describing what it was like to continue to compose music in your head when you could no longer actually hear it.

But would Beethoven be able to survive as a musician in the 21st century? His proclamation that he was the greatest musician to ever live, might be questioned today.

If you are interested in learning more about Beethoven, this play is a “must see”. Cutler has a humorous, but cutting style that intrigues the audience from the moment he steps on stage.



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


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
