## **Dependent Theatre Productions—MTYP Mainstage**

Simply put, *Huff* is one of the best pieces of theatre I have seen in a long, long time. Cliff Cardinal has written a brilliant script about the joys, desolation, despair, and hope in an aboriginal family on a remote reserve. He then dives into performing three generations of characters (and some extras) with incredible emotional range, deft and subtle changes, holding back nothing either in his script or his acting.

The simple staging is augmented by some great projection work (that made me think of Guy Madden) and beautiful ethereal soundscapes. The intimate story told by Cliff is about a community, a people, who are an integral part of the Canadian fabric. It is a story for today, and it deserves having a lot of bums in those MTYP seats. This is Fringe at its very best.

The songs are authentic (although from World War I) and if the transition from home front to more serious issues needs work, that's a small quibble to hear the little lady with the big voice. She even sells her own CDs with the show's songs. This means I can now spin a yarn, and needle our audience with a song from Knitting All the Day every Saturday!

Do yourself a favour, bring some knitting, and be prepared to be completely entertained by this beautiful songbird! She is also working with another great singer on this Fringe circuit, Bremner Duthrie, in *Ne Me Quitte Pas Piaf* and *Brel: The Impossible Concert* at the same transplanted Venue, the Crocus Building (Bannatyne).
