

While the play doesn't seem to have quite as much room for broad interpretation as some of Dockery's previous work, theories were still ricocheting around the head of this viewer well into the next day. I loved his explanations of the difference between Japanese and English speakers, and his impression of drunken Scots in a titty bar, one of his first, eye-opening gigs. His stories of his struggles to become a performer and his motivation will move anyone who has faced adversity and won.

His claims to not speak English well are false. He is so eloquent, insightful, and driven and his

choice of words shows a deep intelligence and understanding of the human condition.

He's sure to become a favourite of performers and patrons, alike. Please don't miss Hiroshi!


