I always look forward to seeing a company courageous enough to mess with Shakespeare. The material is so strong that considerable liberty can be taken with it with enjoyable results. Unfortunately, this show only almost succeeds.

These are three charming and personable guys. Easy on the eyes? Yes. Fun? Yes. So what is the problem?

It is that, anatomically correct nomenclature aside, a one-joke show is still a one-joke show, and it wears thin after forty-five minutes. I was pleasantly surprised that they didn't resort to common slang terms (bravo), but the four or five drawn out warnings about content and ten-year-olds (with nary a ten-year-old in the house) were unnecessary at the 10:30 PM show.

Some variety came from dirty limericks, but some of the authentic Elizabethan stuff is much more suggestive. The attempt to include modern references throughout did not entirely succeed. They were almost cut-and-paste kinds of moments.

Most of all, I missed the wit of Shakespeare, and with more thought, the script could have been wittier. Overall, the performances were very loose, which made it difficult to differentiate between kibitzing and acting. It could be that this was deliberate, but it didn't work for me.

To wrap up, not a bad show, but not one I would put high on my list of go-sees. Fun in a late-night, goofy sort of way, but much more could have been made of the material.


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
