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## **Bash On Regardless**

#### Winnipeg's Contemporary Dancers—SCD

This is a remarkable interpretation of the saga of Canadian writer Elizabeth Smart and her tumultuous love affair with married British poet George Barker, by whom she had four children. Six dancers portray the resolute lovers and the offspring they conceived, and through both words and dance, the dancers superbly convey the wide range of extreme emotions that can only be found in such a complicated affair, especially this one.

With this type of ensemble piece, I hesitate to single anyone out, but I must give a nod to Sarah Roche whose outstanding dance and monologue very near the end was practically a showstopper. This young woman is an extraordinary actor as well as a gifted dancer. Overall, this show-which will form the basis for an expanded version next year-is filled with power and strength.

#### The Scents Of Tang

#### Alexandra Elliott &...—Rachel Browne Theatre

Don't let the title (Tang short for 'tango') and the spoken introduction regarding this play being inspired by Argentinian tango fool you. That is only the vehicle for this modern-dance piece.

This is a sharp-edged, anguished exploration of youthful rivalry and popularity among peers that leads to violence, as these scenarios all-too-often do in real life.

Performed by five local dancers including choreographers Alexandra Elliott and Renée Vandale, this is a multi-layered production open to personal interpretation. You may very well come away with something quite different from my impression. In the opening sequences, there is one popular girl leading three followers, but soon an interloper appears. Through intense dance and physical theatre, including brutal confrontation, this rival succeeds in wooing the first girl's followers away and they soon turn on her, leaving her lying on the ground-beaten and bloody. But that's not the ending.

I must single out dancer Keren Parker who portrayed one of the followers, but did so in such an expert way that I began to suspect her character was filled with reluctance. At the end, Parker performs a beautiful solo dance oozing with guilt for betrayal and desire for what she lost, leading to a dance duet featuring Parker and Nicole Coppens that is filled with love and reconciliation. The show may have some violent elements, but overall, this production exudes sensuality.
